



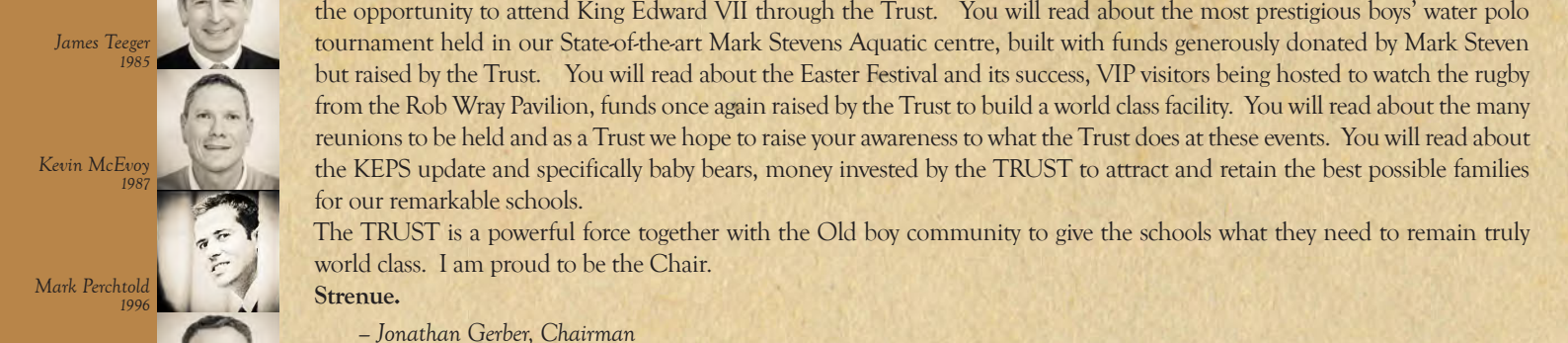

The 41st edition of the KES Water Polo Tournament was an affair that featured 16 of the top boy's school teams across South Africa. From the Western Cape to KZN, Eastern Cape to Gauteng all was to be played for at this prestigious event.

St John's College, having won the 40th edition of the tournament, Bishops Diocesan College and SACS came into the tournament as the favourites to possibly claim the gold. However, Rondebosch had other plans.

The first two days of the tournament were filled with intense, energy filled games with a vibrant crowd filling the Mark Stevens Aquatics Centre. Supporters from all over the country were present in numbers to edge on their boys in this highly contested tournament. On day two as the KES boys came in ready to do business against the boys from Clifton. At the brink of day as the dew of the early morning blanketed the Reds and Tutty Fisher fields, the men in red claimed an important victory. Although the KES team went down 0-1 early on, they would come back guns blazing to win the game 9-4.

The playoffs in the afternoon of Day 2 saw the continuation of the magnificent show of athletic prowess that the boys had to offer. The top 8 had now been set. KES, SACS, St John's, St Stephanus, Hilton, Rondebosch, Bishops and Paul Roos were all fuelled and charging for the top spot. Our men from KES would unfortunately go down against a well-drilled SACS team, thus ending their title charge.

On Day 3, Bishops and Rondebosch were set to meet in the semi-final along with St John's meeting SACS. Rondebosch and St John's would stand victorious and solidify their place in the final. The final was an enthralling affair with both teams looking to claim the top spot. Rondebosch would, however, charge on and claim the gold over the defending champions St John's College. My team ended the tournament in 8th place, improving significantly from a 12th place finish in 2023.
